

Find Out About the Kidney Transplant Process

- Q Is a transplant the best option for people with kidney disease?
- A A kidney transplant is the best option for many people with kidney disease, because it has been shown to increase patients' life expectancy and improve their quality of life.



Q - How do I find the right transplant center for me?

- A It is important to choose a transplant center that has performed a large number of successful transplants. You may also want to choose a transplant center that is located near you, since you will need to visit frequently for your appointments.
- Q Why do some patients wait on the transplant waiting list longer than others?
- A The amount of time an individual waits on the transplant list depends on many factors that include the person's blood type; and whether he or she has had a previous transplant, blood transfusion, or pregnancy.

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What You Need to Know About Getting on the Waiting List for a Transplant



The United Network of Organ Sharing (UNOS) Organ Center manages the national waiting list for transplants from deceased donors. To get on the national transplant waiting list you must take the following steps:

- 1. Request a referral from your physician;
- 2. Contact and choose a transplant hospital that best suits your needs (location, quality of care, finances, etc.);
- 3. Schedule an appointment for an evaluation to find out if you are an eligible transplant candidate; and
- 4. Ask questions during the evaluation to learn more about the transplant process.

Once you have completed these steps and are found to be an eligible candidate for a transplant, your name and information will be added to the transplant list.
